

has several programs in place to improve the growth and development of the Chamber, as well as providing opportunities to connect and serve in the Belton community. These programs include Ambassadors, Leadership Belton, Mentor Belton, Business After-Hours, Chamber Coffee Connection (C3), Legislative/Governmental Affairs, and Military Relations Committee.

The Ambassadors program provides opportunities for members to be actively involved in welcoming new members with ribbon cuttings and other celebrations. They represent the Chamber in connecting with our members and in hosting the annual awards banquet.

The Leadership Belton program is a year-long leadership training experience providing participants opportunities to learn about and connect with the community. The program meets one day per month focusing on a different aspect of the community, including Social Services, Education, Healthcare, Economic Development, City and County Government, State Government – Day at the Capitol, Fort Cavazos, Recreation/Quality of Life

and more. Mentor Belton is a program pairing UMHB students with mentors in the community to promote workforce development.

Networking opportunities provide opportunities to connect and with others within our business community.

Business After-Hours is a monthly event designed for members to gather in a social setting for networking and to meet new members. This event also provides an opportunity for the host organizations to showcase their business.


Chamber Coffee Connection (C3) is a Chamber event geared toward all members and potential members who are interested in learning about member organizations or specific programs in our community. Often, a non-profit organization is featured.

The Chamber is actively engaged in legislative and governmental affairs, hosting legislative updates and providing information to citizens about notable issues, including a monthly interaction with State Representative Hugh Shine. Our Military Relations Committee serves as the focus of coordination for our outreach, not only to neighboring Fort Cavazos, but also to military families living in our community. 

# BELTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

Belton ISD is one of the fastest-growing public school districts in Texas, with new families joining the Big Red Community each year. The district currently serves about 13,650 students but expects to reach an enrollment near 15,500 by 2027. The Big Red Community is committed to providing exceptional learning experiences for each and every student. The district's 20 campuses are spread across 198.6 square miles that include Belton, Morgan's Point, part of Temple and unincorporated areas of Bell County.



Belton High School and Lake Belton High School stand out for their award-winning extracurricular and career and technical education programs, while Belton New Tech @ Waskow is a popular school of choice open to



BISD students in grades 9-12.

Belton ISD has earned a reputation for academic excellence, innovative programs and an abundance of extracurricular opportunities. This year's achievements include:

The newest BISD campus – James L. Burrell Elementary – which opened in January 2024. Hubbard Branch Elementary, current-



ly under construction, will open in August of 2024.

1,400 students participated in Advanced Placement and 49 percent of our students who have taken the AP exams (779) scored a 3 or higher meaning that 265 students earned AP scholar distinctions.

BISD was one of only 17 districts accepted to the Leadership Collaborative through the Holdsworth Center, a nonprofit focused

on building leaders in public education. The Leadership Collaborative is designed to develop aspiring principals.

The BISD Board of Trustees advocated for an innovative and inclusive program called The Penguin Project. Last year, the first-ever collaboration with Belton ISD and The Penguin Project culminated in outstanding performances of "Annie Jr." The Penguin Project productions are unique because all of the roles are filled by young artists with developmental disabilities. They are joined on stage by a dedicated group of "peer mentors" who volunteer to work side-by-side with

them through months of rehearsals and in the final performance. The collaboration with The Penguin Project was an idea championed by the Belton ISD Board of Trustees because it aligns with the district's Values & Beliefs, each and every student deserves exceptional learning experiences according to their unique needs and passions. The 2024 spring performance will be "Finding Nemo Jr."

Belton ISD believes parents are their child's first and most important teachers. That's why we invite parents to come alongside our classroom teachers and staff. Parents are encouraged to volunteer at schools, en-





gage in district activities and stay informed about curriculum and learning opportunities.

In May 2022, voters approved a \$173,825,000 bond to address growth, aging and evolving facilities, program equity, and safety and technology in Belton ISD. Administrators have been hard at work to make the promised projects a reality. Projects underway include the construction of two new elementary schools, additions and renovations at several campuses, safety and security upgrades, and the purchase of new buses. # **BISD-ATHLETICS**

Belton ISD athletics has aspirations of producing months and months of memorable moments this year. Regardless of what happens, though, forgetting 2023 will be difficult. Belton and Lake Belton experienced a wealth of success in 365 days in a variety of sports by advancing to the playoffs, earning awards, signing scholarships and delivering signature athletic feats.

And no single player commanded more attention than Broncos wide receiver Micah Hudson. The senior was the most coveted collegiate recruit in Lake Belton's brief history, receiving offers from countless schools, including powerhouse programs Texas, Alabama, A&M, Georgia, Miami, LSU and Ohio State.

Hudson decided to continue his career at Texas Tech, however, sending shockwaves across the college football landscape, and during his final season at Lake Belton, he proved worthy of the hype. Among the honors Hudson garnered, he was named 4-5A, Division I All-District Most Valuable Player for the second consecutive season after accounting for 1,400 total yards of offense, catching 70 passes for 1,353 yards and 18 touchdowns to go with 158 yards and another score rushing.

The showing propelled the Broncos to a record of 8-3, 6-2 en route to returning to the playoffs, but it did not compare to the Tigers' run. Belton (10-2, 5-1 District 11-5A, Division II) only lost one game during the regular season to defend its outright district title, and while there was some concern about where each team would reside fol-

lowing the University Interscholastic League's biennial reclassification and realignment, both will remain. Although the construction of each program's district will be altered when the official realignments are released in February, Lake Belton will stay in Class 5A, Division I and Belton will stay in Class

5A, Division II.

Jones claimed Lake Belton's first state title by winning the 200-meter dash in 20.57 seconds, and he was part of the Broncos' third-place 800 relay team, joining Ty Legg, Dawson Cabiad and Hudson. Belton senior Sydney Alamein qualified for two events at the state swimming meet, becoming the school's first representative since 2018, and the Tigers and Lady Tigers also thrived outside of the pool. On the

soccer pitch, standout Makenna Morrow – the program's all-time leading scorer – guided the Lady Tigers to their first regional final since 2000. She was named all-district most valuable player and an all-state honorable mention. Team district championships were also earned by Lake Belton baseball and Lady Broncos volleyball thanks to undefeated performances.

The Broncos only allowed six runs in 14 district games, while pitcher Mason Gerrard was named all-district most valuable player and teammate Mason Law was named pitcher of the year.

Additionally, Tigers powerlifter Isaac Jones and Lake Belton powerlifter Elaina Herrera and Belton cross country runners Briac Ybanez and Olivia Brillhart each made appearances at their respective state meets. On the basketball court, Belton junior Trap Johnson continued his standout career by being named all-district offensive player of the year and landing on the all-region team, setting the stage to potentially join a litany of prior greats by one day receiving the school's greatest honor. Belton's Wall of Honor ushered in two new members in 2023 as Logan Hall, Class of 2018, and 2022 graduate Ayanna Jones were granted the distinction.

Hall currently plays for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, while Ayanna Jones won a track state championship as a senior.

Street not too far from The Gin area. They have a wonderful, unique breakfast selection.





# MK&T DEPOT AND THE KATY FULLY LEASED

The purchase of the MK&T train depot and the KATY by four investment partners in December 2021 sparked a wave of economic growth and turned Downtown Belton into a destination location.

Business partners Terry and Luke Potts undertook the ambitious project to renovate the depot and the neighboring KATY building, in a remarkable revitalization of the area.

The Potts played a significant role in the project going beyond being investors. Terry Potts, alongside Luke, took on the role of contractors and dedicated themselves to reviving the long-abandoned depot.

Over a span of 14 months, they dedicated themselves to carefully restoring the depot and the KATY, using as many original and historic components of the building as possible. Their efforts paid off when they successfully located the original train car and a caboose, which were returned to the City of Belton and became part of the project renovation.

The impact of the redevelopment was tremendous, with an influx of visitors from all over the country.

According to Matt Gunter, one of the project investors, the new development has attracted attention nationwide, drawing people to explore what Belton has to offer. Visitors engage not only in dining and shopping in the train depot, but also in other shops, contributing to the overall economic activity in the area.

"Activity breeds activity," said Gunter, stating that the domino effect of development is having an impact on Belton. Additionally, as more people visit and do business, the city sees a compounding effect, leading to even more future activity. The success of the depot restoration created a vibrant hub of activity and growth and breathed a new life into the heart of Belton for businesses and opportunities in Belton.

Gunter expressed his optimism that Belton will see continued growth for the future.

"With so many opportunities for growth, expansion, and business opportunities, Belton is 'ripe for the picking'," said Gunter.

In October 2023, the MK&T and the KATY were fully leased as a mixed use commercial area for a total of 10 new businesses including The Blackbird Book & Spirits, Railway Express Diner, Off the Rails Wine Bar, Pizza PieRos, Warm Cookie Company, Z&H Candy, Early Light Creperie, Sly Fox coffee, 100x35 Latin Cuisine, and Katy Deli.

Nestled on the corner of First Avenue and East Street in Downtown Belton, the renovated train depot stands as a testament to the power of vision, hard work, and community collaboration. Gunter emphasized that the success of this project was not solely dependent on one person, but required the involvement and collaboration of business partners, city approval for plans, designers and community support.

# **EXPLORE BELTON'S PARKS AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES**

Some of the best amenities in the region are among the 21 recreational facilities in Belton. Miller Springs Nature Center, Heritage Park and the Nolan Creek Hike & Bike Trail are just a few of the attractions within the Belton Parks and Recreation system. These locations each provide unique opportunities to enjoy the best nature has to offer here in Central Texas—and Heritage Park, with the Leon River as its western border, is one of the main hubs for youth sports in the region.

Miller Springs is a 265-acre nature park popular with hikers, bikers, bird watchers and others. It is located near the Belton Dam and allows those who use the facility to enjoy everything from unique vistas to secluded woods. The park is a destination for locals and visitors alike. Miller Springs is operated through a partnership between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the cities of Belton and Temple.

Many changes are being made at



Heritage Park, with plans to preserve and improve upon the current park. Belton Parks and Recreation is dedicated to creating a space that meets the needs of the community. Phase I is nearly complete

and includes high priority items, such as an additional multi-use recreation field that soccer players will appreciate, more

parking, extension of Park Lane Road for access through Heritage Park, and a pavilion with restroom facilities. Other amenities include a fish camp and kayak dock. In addition to being a venue for youth recreation sports leagues, Heritage Park THE CITY OF BELTON, also hosts Ultimate Frisbee and Disc Golf tour-

naments, which are open to adults.

The Nolan Creek Hike & Bike Trail is a 3.3-mile path through the heart of Belton providing great views of nature and the commercial area downtown. The trail begins south of IH-35, and connects three parks (Liberty, Yettie Polk and Harris Community Park) and the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. The trail also features historic Chisholm Trail storyboards that add an educational component to a recreational experience.

THE ROUND OF CENTRAL ST Liberty Park, in addition to its wideopen spaces and creek access, has plenty of parking, as it is adjacent to the city's Park and Ride commuter facility. Yettie Polk Park's gazebo, seating and beautiful sights has hosted events ranging from parties to concerts, and even weddings. Harris Community Park offers a perfect combination of open space, creek access and one of the most popular

splash pads in the region.

Nolan Creek is a place that draws people interested in the outdoors. Fishermen frequent its banks year-round, and people wade in it in the warmer months. A kayak and tubing trail from



# HARRIS COMMUNITY CENTER

The Harris Community Center in Belton is a local venue that is located nearby the scenic Nolan Creek.

Formally a segregated African American schoolhouse, the building was restored in 2006. The center has quite a history. The earliest record of public education for area African American students dates from 1882 when Mrs. Aleck McGee was hired "to teach the colored school." Professor Thomas Breckenridge Harris (1862-1907), a graduate of Fisk University, became the first instructor at the African American High School in 1890.

The name "West Belton School" was chosen in 1900. In 1936, a new building was erected at the site to house

students of all grade levels. By petition, the school was named "T. B. Harris" for its revered former principal. The last class graduated in 1966, and Belton schools were integrated the following year.

With amenities that include spacious parking, a full-service kitchen, free Wi-Fi, and many different packages to choose from, it's the perfect location to host most any event. The Harris Center staff will also set up the room to your preferred liking.





# THE LENA ARMSTRONG PUBLIC LIBRARY IS CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF SERVICE, 1899 - 2024.

The library began with a Belton woman's study club, The Woman's Wednesday Club. The library occupied a single room at Central Hotel, which was owned and operated by the Women's Commonwealth, a very successful women's religious group with several businesses in Belton and Temple.

When the book collection outgrew the room, the club rented a space in the Harris & Walker building on Main Street. Emma A. Lee was hired as the first librarian, and members of the club set a goal of having a Carnegie Library and began a resilient letter writing campaign to Andrew Carnegie. The letter campaign paid off when, with assurances of support from the City of Belton, a Carnegie grant was awarded.

In 1905, when the Carnegie Library opened at 201 North Main Street it had 1,500 books. In 1975, the library moved to a new building at 301 East 1st Avenue and changed its name to the Belton Public Library. Miss Lee retired in 1924 and was replaced by Miss Louie C. Meyer.

In 1933, the Library Board petitioned the City Council to take over the operations of the library, and the library became part of the city government. In 1946, Miss Meyer retired and was replaced by Miss Lena Armstrong, who served the library for 53 years before retiring in 1998.

After her death in 1999, the library was renamed the Lena Armstrong Public Library due to the deep love and respect the people of Belton had for Lena Armstrong.

Kim Kroll, the current Director of Library Services, was appointed in September 2000.



Currently, the library has over 31,897 items, including print materials, audio, DVDs and electronic print and audio books. In 2018, Library System Services performed a needs assessment of the which included library, feedback from a community survey and various focus groups. The assessment helped the library develop a Strategic Plan, which included five goals to guide the library: 1) Establish a library collection that will meet the needs of a diverse and growing community 2) Become a gathering place for the community 3) Be a good steward of the library's resources, particularly the history of Belton 4) Promote



lifelong learning and innovation, and 5) Serve everyone who enters the library with excellence.

With these ideals in mind, the City of Belton

hired Maureen Arndt, of 720 Design Services, to create a plan for the exterior façade improvements that enhance these strategies. In 2020, the building was painted, a metal canopy was placed over the front door, and the front landscaping was improved. The library now has improved handicap ramps and sidewalks around the entrance-and a beautiful mural facing Penelope Street. The Library has a Friends group, which holds an annual Authors Luncheon to raise funds for the library and to support the free book give aways at community events like Christmas on the Chisholm Trail.

# BELTON FIRE DEPARTMENT SERVES THE COMMUNITY

Staff Report

The Belton Fire Department is a group of dedicated professionals who work to enhance the quality of life in the community by delivering expert-level fire & emergency service response, fire prevention, and public education, as well as providing any other service it is equipped to deliver.

The Fire Department continually seeks innovative improvements to the services it provides in an effort to create a safe, economically viable, and inclusive community for all people.

The Department remains a "Recognized" fire department through the Texas Fire Chief's Associ-



ation. Recognition for Best Practices is a comprehensive self-assessment pro-

cess, which enables fire departments to compare their practices to the best industry standards.

In June 2020, Chief Jon Fontenot was hired. Under his leadership several positive changes have occurred, including the services provided by firefighters. Chief Fontenot replaced former Fire Chief Bruce Pritchard, who retired. Chief Fontenot has more than 25 years of fire service experience and has a Master's Degree in Public Administration.

Some of the changes initiated in 2020 included the establishment of an additional Fire Captain position, outsourcing EMS services to American Medical Response (a national leader in the EMS field), and in-

creasing the number of firefighters assigned to each Fire response crew. In addition, the Belton Fire Department became a certified training facility for many Fire Department certification courses.

A major adjustment that has received positive feedback from the Department is the change to the firefighter work schedule from 24-hour shifts with 48-hours off between shifts to firefighters working 48-hour shifts with 96-hours off between shifts. This gives crews more consecutive time to mentally decompress from the hardships seen while on shift. The increase in consecutive decompression time leads to more mentally healthy and stable firefighters.

The health of firefighters is a constant concern. In addition to mental health, the City and Department Command staff are committed to physical

health and well-being. In 2020, each fire station was outfitted with new commercial grade on tractor was hing machines which removes carcinogens from contaminated firefighting gear. Utilization of the ex-

tractor after each fire reduces the exposure to potentially harmful carcinogens. Each fire truck has also been equipped with decontamination supplies to quickly remove contaminates from crews before leaving a scene.

What to expect in the future: The focus of the Fire Department is making sure its approach to the work is more proactive than reactive. The focus is on preventing accidents and injuries, while providing professional level response when incidents do occur. The number of safety and training courses will be increased, as well as presentations offered to the community at no cost. Code enforcement activities will also be emphasized to ensure businesses are safe to visit. Partnering with local businesses helps improve safety.

The Belton Fire Department appreciates the community support it has received over the years.



lows people to meet the police officers who work diligently to protect them every day.

The Belton Police Department was the first law enforcement agency in Bell County to be accredited as a Recognized Law Enforcement Agency by the Enforcement Texas Law Best Practices Recognition Program. The recognition program evaluates compliance with more than 170 Best Practices for Texas Law Enforcement. These best practices were developed by Texas law enforcement professionals to assist agencies to efficiently and effectively serve the public and protect individual rights. They cover all aspects of law enforcement operations including use of force, protection of citizen rights, vehicle pursuits, property and evidence management,

and patrol and investigative operations.

The Belton Citizens Helping in Police Services (CHIPS) program was formed in late 2011 as a way to expand police resources through volunteers. A benefit of the program is that it deters crime through visible presence. CHIPS volunteers supplement department resources by being extra eyes and ears while patrolling parks, shopping cen-

ters, and other areas where large groups may gather. Each year, Belton PD partic-

ipates in more than 100 community outreach events. Additionally, volunteers help with administrative tasks inside the police building and at community outreach functions. CHIPS are graduates of the Citizens Police Academy Program and attend additional training specific to the CHIPS program. CHIPS staff the phones for the RU OK Program, which works to ensure safety and provide help to the elderly of Belton. The RU OK Program has 13 life saves to date. In a typical year, CHIPS members volunteer

over 7,000 hours of service to the department. The Belton Police Department is dedicated to treating all persons with respect, dignity, and professionalism.

## **BELTON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION**

The BEDC (Belton Economic Development Corporation) was created in 1990 after the Belton citizens voted in favor to adopt the state's Type A Sales Tax Program, an initiative introduced and supported by the city council. Acceptable projects for the BEDC are governed by state law for Type A Corporations and by policies established by the board of directors and the Belton City Council.

The board of directors consists of five community business leaders appointed to three-year terms by the Belton City Council. Current board members include Brandon Bozon, Stevie Spradley, Marion Grayson, John Holmes and Tyson McLaughlin.

"We are still seeing a lot of requests for building space. Companies are interested in Texas. Companies we have here in Belton are still in the growth mode. The Imagine Belton plan was developed last year. This project is a joint effort between the City of Belton and BEDC. It is a vision for the downtown area," said Executive Director Cynthia Hernandez. Under Hernandez's leadership the focus of BEDC's services have in-creased to include local businesses. Traditionally Economic Development Corporations focus on attracting businesses then moving on to the next potential business thinking of relocating. They recently closed on 8.78 acres of land along 6th Ave near downtown Belton. The property is zoned Retail along 6th Ave and light industrial along the southern side of the property.

Traditional Industrial out of Dallas purchased 19 acres in the Belton Industrial Park and added another 8.56 acres outside of the park for the development of four office buildings. The four buildings will add 344,000 square feet of office space in the park. These buildings are to be listed as Class A commercial real estate.

There are two business parks in Belton. Belton Business Park located along Hwy. 190 and Loop 121 has excellent access to water, fiber optics, interstate and 3-phase electricity. Highway 93 Industrial Park is just off of IH-35 and is where Belton's heavy industry is located.

Belton has an excellent school system and quality of life.

Belton is located at the point where Hwy. 190 and IH-35 connect. Close to Austin, Dallas and San Antonio the Belton community is at the heart of one of the top growing areas in the country. The Killeen Regional Airport is just 15-miles away.

Each year the BEDC assists new companies interested in establishing operations in the City of Belton, encourages expansion of local companies, continues developing the Belton Business Park, and supports infrastructure projects in the community to spur growth.

Business Roundtable meetings featuring special presentations are held quarterly to encourage networking among industry representatives, present topics of common interest and provide opportunities to learn and support our local industry.

The BEDC also holds quarterly meetings with industries located in the Belton Business Parks. The meetings are more of a roundtable affair with a speaker provided. Ana Borchardt, Director of Business Development and Retention for the BEDC is in charge of making these meetings a reality.

"Building relationships with our current industries and businesses is as important as new industry development," said Hernandez. Under Hernandez's leadership the focus of BEDC's services have increased to include local businesses.





### **BELL COUNTY MUSEUM**

The Bell County Museum was founded on April 25, 1988 by the Bell County Commissioners Court and is part of the county government. The Bell County Museum collects, preserves and interprets the historical and cultural heritage of the Bell County region for all of its citizens. The museum is housed in the beautifully restored 1905 Belton Carnegie Library building, which is a recorded Texas Historical Landmark and listed in the National Register of Historical Places. Prior to the museum being opened to the public in 1991, the county and museum board embarked on a "Save the Museum" campaign to update and restore the Belton Carnegie Library. The campaign raised the nec-

essary \$400,000 to restore the beautiful beaux-arts building. In 2006, the Guffy unique structure that bridges contemporary style with historical architectural integri-



Building was renovated and connected to the Carnegie Library building, creating a ty. The award-winning Bell County Museum features a permanent interactive exhibit on the Gault Archaeological Site. The exhibit offers an in-depth look at this important excavation through dynamic interactive areas. The Gault Site is one of the largest excavated sites of the Clovis culture (13,500 years ago) and a Texas State Archeological Landmark. In 2024, the museum hosted several interesting exhibits. "Images of Bell County" will feature rarely seen photos and postcards of historic Bell County. "The Vietnam Experience" will feature artworks by Navy artists stationed in Vietnam during the conflict. The exhibit will also feature artifacts from the museum collection. In addition to temporary exhibits, the

### **BELTON'S 4TH OF JULY CELEBRATION**

Throughout the United States, particularly in smaller towns and rural areas, the Fourth of July, Independence Day, has always been recognized as a big and important holiday, a time for community gatherings and remembrance, a time to honor, commemorate, recognize and celebrate freedom and independence from tyranny and the vision of the Founding Fathers in 1776.

July 4th in Belton is known both nationwide and worldwide. What the world saw then remains as true now as it



has ever been; the Fourth of July festivities in Belton are basically the same as described in the first recorded Independence Day celebration in 1852, as well as when they became an annual tradition in 1919. 





### **BELTON SENIOR ACTIVITY CENTER**

The Center was first established on Feb. 5, 1976, as it met at the current American Legion Post 55 building. The Center raised funds and, through a grant, was able to construct a building on its current site at 842 Mitchell St. on Feb. 24, 1981.

"It is delightful to work here at the Center. I have met so many wonderful people. They all have a story to tell. The Center is an activity-oriented facility. Many come just to visit," said Director Judy Owens. "We are open to suggestions on activities."

It is a Belton Senior Activity Center in many ways. Exercise classes are provided by a grant from Baylor Scott and White. The class-



es are free to the public and participation is growing. They are held on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. It is exercise at your own pace with equipment provided.

Woodcarving is on each Monday. There is a group of artisans there working on carvings and etchings each week. It isn't uncommon for someone to come to watch and learn

Quilting and line dancing are on Tuesdays. Quilting is a major fundraiser for the Senior Center. Quilters are needed at the center. Custom orders can be made to the center. A Canasta card game is held every Tuesday and Thursday. Bridge is held every Friday afternoon.

Bingo is held at noon on Wednesday with prizes given. Between 35-40 residents show up for the Bingo games each week.

Dances with a live band are held on the first and third Thursday of each month. A cover charge of \$5 is used



Today, the Board of Directors of the Belton Area Citizens for Seniors salutes the men and women who had the vision and did the work to establish the center. We are thankful that they and the original senior citizens who formed the Belton Senior Activity Center created something so important to the quality of life in Belton. We remain committed to keep that vision going for years to come."

### **BCYC**

For decades, the Belton Christian Youth Center (BCYC) has served the local community through its commitment to the youth and its promotion of Christian values. Located at 505 E. Avenue C, BCYC is a nonprofit activity center that offers after-school and summer programs for area children, providing plentiful opportunities for learning and fun.

BCYC is licensed by the state to provide childcare for up to 175 students. When the local schools

are in session BCYC is an after-school program. A warm meal is provided each after-noon. During the summer months, BCYC is a full-day program offering three meals.

The facility is over 38,000 sq ft with eight classrooms, two kitchens, a dining area, a playground area, and a full basketball court.

There were over 500 children who signed up for the basketball league last fall.

They currently have five vans and three school buses to provide transportation to the school. The buses require a CDL commercial license to operate. One of their biggest challenges is maintaining the buses.

BCYC offers volleyball recreation leagues in the

spring and the fall.

The youth center's story dates back to 1982 when it originally began operation in the gymnasium of a Belton elementary school. In response to positive community support, activities expanded year-round, and, in 1999, the program moved to its current location.


Each year, BCYC

serves around 1,200 students, and the praise of parents and community members speaks to the program's long-standing reputation of success. The children raised over 500 lbs. of food for the Helping Hands Ministry for Thanksgiving this past fall.

### **LAKES AND CAMPING**

Staff Report

In Belton, we not only take pride in our Parks and Recreation, but also our lakes and our camping facilities. So many things and so much recreational time in the summer is spent around Belton Lake and Stillhouse Hollow. There are camping areas, including RV parks, campsites and screened shelters. There are places for recreational water activities, nature trails, picnicking areas and hunting and fishing areas. Another thing people love to do is go out on their boats and jet skis and feel the breeze and refreshment of the water on a hot summer's day.

Belton Lake's camping fees are very affordable; under \$50 and vary depending on location and utilities. The daily use fee is \$5 per vehicle or pedestrian in the parks. Boat ramp fees are \$5, and group facility fees are typically \$100 or less.

Cedar Ridge Park Campground is located at Belton Lake, which provides some of the best fishing, camping, and boating in Central Texas. This



year-round campground accommodates both tents and RVs and has several sites with screened shelters for those who do not have camping equipment. The facility provides many amenities, including hot showers and group picnic areas. A concession marina within the park offers fuel and basic convenience store items, as well as a seasonal restaurant.

White Flint Park is located at Belton Lake, which provides some of the best

fishing, camping and boating in Central Texas. This year-round campground has 12 sites with screened overnight shelters and 13 RV sites, all with water and electric hookups.

Winkler Park is a small, primitive campground on the northern shore of Belton Lake in central Texas. This facility does not have electricity but does have individual water hookups, paved back-in sites, and a central restroom with showers. There are 14 sites available for RVs and tents.

Temples Lake Park is a day-use facility with over 60 picnic sites and one reservable group area on the southern shore of Belton Lake. The lake provides some of the best fishing and boating in Central Texas and the park offers amenities for large groups of up to 80 people, such as flush toilets, showers, a playground, a swim beach, and two two-lane boat ramps.

Westcliff Park is a day-use area and



campground located on the southwestern shore of Belton Lake. The lake provides some of the best fishing and boating in Central Texas in addition to amenities such as a swimming beach, boat ramp, playground, and picnic areas for RVs and tents, including four tent-only primitive sites.

Belton Lakeview Park has two reservable group day-use areas along the lower shore of Belton Lake, providing some of the best fishing and boating in Central Texas. The facility is perched on a bluff overlooking Belton Lake and Dam, a year-round scenic location for group picnics and large gatherings. The site offers many amenities, such as flush toilets, water and electric hookups, a playground, and a two-lane boat ramp, ensuring your stay is both comfortable and enjoyable.


Live Oak Ridge Campground is located at Belton Lake, which provides some of the best fishing, camping, and boating in Central Texas. This year-round campground accommodates both tents and RVs and has many amenities. such as a playground, showers, and a group meeting area. Belton Lake was created by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers with the construction of the Belton Dam in 1954. The 12.300-acre lake is located on the Leon River, just upstream of the confluence of the Leon River and the Little River.

Stillhouse Hollow is south of U.S. Highway 190 on FM 1670. There are more than 30 campsites at Union Grove Park that include RVC and tent camping. Restrooms and showers are accessible and



provided, as well as access to the water for swimming and boating. There are four ramps around the lake. One is located near the marina at Dana Peak Park, at the south end of Union Grove, at the end of the park road at River's Bend, and at Cedar Gap.

At Stillhouse Hollow, there are also nature trails for those who prefer the land. There is one at Dana Peak Park that is open from dawn until dusk and can be used for hiking, horseback riding, biking, and other outdoor recreational activities. Stillhouse Hollow's camping fees range from \$12 to \$40, depending on location and utilities. The daily fee is also \$5 for Stillhouse Hollow. For more information, call (254) 939-2461.



Casita Among the Oaks is located on Sparta Road near Belton Lake. This venue includes a jacuzzi tub, a full kitchen and welcomes pets.


Sometimes you want to "get away" when you are away from home. Belton is host to several cottages and cabins, many of them located along the shores of Belton Lake, providing that perfect, tranquil atmosphere. Lake Belton Cottages are located at Arrowhead Point and have a view of

Belton Lake from their deck. One or two-bedroom cottages are available and have rates from nightly to monthly. The cottages have full kitchens, a hot tub, and a laundry room for guests. Summers Mill is located on the banks of Salado Creek in rural Belton, where a historic gristmill still stands from the 1800's. Summers Mill is a retreat and conference center with lodging options available from cottages, cabins, lodges, and homes.

You can find the Ranch Bunkhouse in the rustic countryside of the south Belton area. This venue is perfect for the equestrians and those just wanting to enjoy the peace and quiet of the country. Lodging is available for both you and your horse. There are horse riding and hiking trails that span over 800 acres. Daily continental breakfast is provided and also includes a full kitchen and washer and dryer.

Just outside the gates of The Cadence Bank Center is Belton R.V. Park. In addition to lots for recreational vehicles, they have lodges available for guests. The lodges are available in different sizes with the largest being able to sleep six people. They come with kitchenettes, a private bathroom, a television, and Wi-Fi. An outdoor swimming pool and coin laundry room are also available for guests.





### **LOCAL HEALTHCARE**

Belton is conveniently located between two large medical centers. Baylor Scott & White Medical Center - Temple is one of the state's premiere medical centers with more than 700 physicians, surgeons and specialists involved in service areas of allergy/immunology, cardiology, dermatology, pain management, pediatrics (including endocrinology, gastroenterology, hematology and neonatology), family practice, infectious disease, neurology, ophthalmology, industrial medicine, psychiatry, geriatrics, rheumatology, urology, obstetrics and gynecology.

Seton Medical Center Harker Heights has been growing steadily since construction began in the spring of 2011, and its doors were opened on June 18, 2012. The hospital is a joint venture between Planbased LHP Hospital Group and the Seton Family of Hospitals.

The facility as a whole is 192,400 square feet and has 83 beds, not including the 60,000 square-foot Harker Heights Medical Pavilion. The hospital provides family practice, internal medicine, cardiology, general surgery, orthopedic surgery,

neurosurgery, plastic surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, gastroenterology, otolaryngology, nephrology, neurology, oncology, podiatry, rheumatology and urology services.

In addition to private practices in the area, several hospitals maintain clinics and/or urgent care facilities in Belton.

### **CADENCE BANK CENTER**

The Cadence Bank Center, which prior to renaming in 2023 was the Bell County Expo Center, is Central Texas' largest and most versatile entertainment venue in Bell County.

The big, silver dome stands out to drivers on Interstate 35 and can easily be seen from the air by small aircraft flying in and out of Killeen.

The County Judge John Garth Arena holds 6,000 seats, and the folding chairs on the arena floor raise the total 8,500 seats.

The main Exhibition structure is 100,000 square feet while the Assembly Hall and Special Events room are 12,000 square feet and 5,000 square feet respectively.

The building stands 100

feet high and is a symbol of the unity between Belton, Killeen and Temple.

Before its construction, there had been several discus-

This exposition center was the brainchild of then Bell County John Garth. This project cost \$12 million and was warmly welcomed by the community.

Initially, the Expo Center was constructed primar-

ily to host the Bell County Youth Fair; however, it has been the venue for an assortment of events, including concerts, rodeos, conventions, graduations, banquets and livestock shows. The annual Jehovah's Witness Convention is one of the biggest conventions at the area and brings in between 35,000 to 40,000 over a six-week period.

Handicapped seating is methodically positioned, and the elevator is at the west end of the north concourse

The newly established, 17,000 square feet Equine/Livestock Complex on the west side of the campus held its first event in 2018. Add

MPR has had between 15-20 new home construction in the past few years.

MPR Community Pool sits on a finger reaching out into the lake with a spectacular view unmatched in Bell County. MPR's Marina has a waiting list of around a year long. The docks are state-of-the-art with lighting and video cameras. Many of the law enforcement and Army Corps of Engineers boats use this facility, which includes a dock for fuel.

The Garrett and Mic Hill Event Center was completely renovated. With a pool and the best view of Belton Lake, the event center is rented out for a variety of special occasions. A screen cover was added to the kid pool.




# **UNIVERSITY OF MARY HARDIN-BAYLOR'S SPORTS**




UMHB Men's Basketball

# **BELL COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT**

Staff Report

The Bell County Sheriff's Department is far from the rough riding, cowboy hat wearing and lasso-handling people expect Texas Sheriffs to be. While they could probably do all of that and more, the Sheriff's responsibilities include everything from patrol, investigations, civil and criminal process, jail management and court service.

Though Sheriffs may not be like they appear in old western movies, they certainly are not less effective or cool. The Bell County Sheriff's Department are highly trained technologically, mentally, physically and know

the law back and forth. People look up to the Sheriff's Department as law enforcers, and the Sheriff's Department takes pride and provides the best service possible for the citizens of Bell County, from warrants to civil issues.

The Civil section of the Bell County Sheriff's Department is responsible for serving all the civil process papers issued from the Attorney General's Office, County and District Offices, private law firms and people who may request services. This includes the serving of Subpoenas Sequestrations, Order of Sales, Writ of Possessions, Forcible Detainers, Protective Orders, Injunctions and other services of process.

The Warrant section of the Bell County Sheriff's Office, however, deals more with criminals because they are responsible for all felony and misdemeanor warrants issued in Bell County that are filed with the Sheriff's Department. Not only can the Sheriff's Department serve warrants and write them, but they can also log, maintain, update and recall the warrants in Bell County, be it a misdemeanor or felonious.

The Bell County Sheriff's Department also maintains an Animal Control Division. The office is responsible for handling all domesticated animal calls. which include care. treatment and transportation of animals. When needed, the Sheriff's Department can issue citations for statutory violations, trapping animals, rabies quarantines and euthanizing animals, as it may be in the best interest of the safety of the community. They also work with animal adoption agencies to find homes for pets and want to better the lives of the animals and people of Bell County. They are also responsible for Zoonosis control and guidelines, which detail how to handle a situation with a dangerous wild animal and the caging requirements and standards for such animals that may be dangerous.

development and an exposure to missions and servanthood.

"These are very important to the culture of our school," Russell said. "In order to transform somebody, you have to be involved in it, so we're trying to really give them the opportunity to practice what we're preaching."

CTCS also hosts a schoolwide mission day, wherein all students and faculty take a halfday to visit and volunteer at local organizations.

In addition to these service opportunities, each grade level is assigned a different organization to serve throughout the school year. Over the last three years, our students donated over \$26,000 to the Food for Family food drive.

Class sizes are smaller at CTCS, contributing to the strong student-teacher relationships that provide both parties with ample opportunities for success: approximately 16 students are assigned a classroom for elementary school, 22 students per class for middle and high schoolers, and a maximum of 12 students in Pre-K.

Advanced Placement (AP) and dual credit courses are offered to high school students, and CTCS has attained a dual accreditation through the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and COGNIA.

Supplementing benchmarks throughout the year, the Iowa Test is used for standardized testing through eighth grade, and the PSAT and SAT are used for ninth through 12th graders.

Extracurricular opportunities and a selection of electives establish well-rounded, service-minded individuals. Fine Arts and elective courses, such as art, band, choir, photojournalism, technology and theatre are incorporated into the students' schedules, which adds up to eight classes per day for middle and high schoolers, and elementary students are placed in self-contained classes. A variety of programs are made available to CTCS students outside of the classroom, such as Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Praise Band, the aforementioned retreat and mission programs, Student Ambassador Leadership Team, Student Leadership University and Student Council.

The school started its high school STEM Club in the 2016-2017 school year, followed by the middle school STEM Club the following year, 2017-2018. The high school students have been awarded 100 top 10 finishes in state across five years of competitions. Thirty of those entries were awarded best in state. In any given year, three students up to as many as 17 students have competed across 40 categories. In 2021, CTCS HS was awarded 3rd place in state among small schools.

The middle school STEM club students have been awarded 63 top 10 finishes in state four years of competitions, with 33 of those entries - more than half - being awarded best in state. In any given year, a total of six to 14 students compete across 28 categories. In 2018, one team competed nationally in Forensic Technology. In 2019 and 2021, teams qualified for Nationals in Forensic Technology. In both 2018 and 2021, CTCS MS was awarded 2nd place in state among small schools.

As a private institution, CTCS does charge annual tuition rates and enrollment fees, but offers financial assistance for qualifying families. Each spring a public Open House is offered for current transitioning students, as well as those families interested in learning more about CTCS.For more information on CTCS, visit their website at https://www.ctcslions.com.
